

1. KFPS business

1.1 Summary of the year 2021

2021 was an eventful year. The Corona measures certainly put the creativity of the KFPS to the test. And staff changes in the organisation presented even more challenges. In spite of everything, membership numbers went up, more foals were registered and we took a firm stand about health and life expectancy being basic preconditions in the breeding of Friesian horses.

Again, Corona measures had a strong overall impact on the year 2021, which was also characterized by the role of the livestreams, a welcome alternative. The Stallion Inspection could only go ahead in an online version. The twelve breeding days took place with a limited number of spectators. We missed the sociability of previous years but fortunately, breeding still went ahead. Luckily, the Central Inspection 2021 made up for a lot of things. The exceptionally hospitable location of Manege Gaasterland in Harich proved to be a hit and there was a pleasant buzz around the rings, with fantastic weather as a bonus. Finally.

The livestreams however, have not disappeared and seem to have become a permanent fixture in the communication of the KFPS towards its members. Not just for all fans in the homeland, but the foreign members in particular are avid followers of Friesian breeding via their screens. The exchange of knowledge is of immense value and the involvement exactly how we like to see it. Inspections could only be organised in countries where it was allowed and if accessible by car.

All the while, 2021 was also a year of internal instability. After eighteen years, Director Ids Hellinga left us and we also welcomed a new Chairman. Interim Chairman Detlef Elling, succeeded by Chairwoman Tineke Schokker as well as Director Marijke Akkerman and their team have not only managed to keep the KFPS vessel on course, but they have also taken the first steps towards innovation. Full of hope and energy we set sail for 2022.

1.2 Regions and Member Council

Due to the Corona measures the regional Spring meeting of 2021 took place online. On the 19th of May, Interim Chairman Detlef Elling opened the meeting with the announcement that Ids Hellinga was going to leave the KFPS. The Board of the Koninklijke Vereniging Het Friesch Paarden-Stamboek has decided, in good consultation with Ids Hellinga, that after eighteen years his employment as KFPS Director comes to an end. With the eye on the future of the society the Board wishes to separate the function of Director from breeding affairs. This new structure

is not compatible with the present situation and therefore the decision was taken mutually to choose a different path. The Studbook is very grateful to Ids Hellinga for everything he has done for the KFPS. With his huge expertise in the field of breeding and genetics he has made a great contribution to the Studbook. In connection with the approval of stallion Boet 516 Harrie Draaijer felt compelled to end his activities for the Studbook. The approval of Boet 516 has resulted in a kind of atmosphere that makes it too difficult for him to function optimally in his role of Inspector. The KFPS is grateful to Harrie Draaijer for his commitment and integrity.

Spring meeting:

- The annual figures of 2020 and the budget 2021 are approved.
- Tineke Schokker and Ella Wiersma are appointed on the Board.
- The Regulations Integrity Committee are approved.
- The motion amendment Regulations Stallion Inspection is approved. In case the Stallion Inspection Committee decides to send a stallion to an external location for examination, the stallion has to be transported there and back directly.

Autumn meeting:

The autumn meetings took place partly online and partly on location, depending on the prevailing Corona measures. The meeting of the Member Council could go ahead on location. Here Tineke Schokker took over the Chairman gavel from Interim Chairman Detlef Elling. The principal points were:

- Approval of the re-definition of the KFPS breeding goal, with the following change in sequence: 1. Health and Vitality, 2.
 Character, 3. Exterior and 4. sport aptitude.
- The Budget and changes in rates and fees are approved.
- The Regulations Stallion Inspection with the integration of various Stallion Selection Regulations is approved.
- An inspection of nursing Star- and Crown mares for upgrading at a later date in the season is approved.

1.3 Development membership numbers

On 31 December 2021 the number of registered Dutch members was: 5.276. Compared to 2020 this is a small rise of 2%. Then the number was 5.162. Foreign numbers also show a small rise of 2% to a total of 5.095.

1.4 Foreign Countries

The KFPS has members in 58 countries across all continents. These foreign members are represented on the KFPS Member Council by 10 delegates. Members can also have a say via the WFHO, an organisation in which all studbooks and associations are united under the KFPS flag.

1.6 Young KFPS

With the organization of online webinars YoungKFPS was off to a good start in 2021. The first webinar of 2021, an online Lunging Course with Lammert Haanstra attracted 200 participants and proved to be very popular. Various webinars followed: Roaring, Linear Scoring, Hirudo Therapy, and a course on Colic Prevention. For the first time this year YoungKFPS and YoungKWPN organised a joint activity: 'A coffee invitation from the Van Manen Brothers', with a good discussion about the contrast between Friesian horses and showdriving horses. Thanks to the ongoing

success of the webinars more webinars will be organised in 2022. Thankfully, YoungKFPS could pick up reorganising physical activities and they made good use of it. A dressage clinic with Amber den Heyer, a driving clinic with Jelle van der Weide and a visit to Esther Liano's yard followed by a discussion evening, all enjoyed a good turnout of members. The Young Breeder was honoured during the Central Inspection, which this year could go ahead again on location. Denise Klap from Heinkenszand (Zeeland) could write the 6th title of Young KFPS Breeder of the Year to her name. She received a free stud service to the value of € 1000.-, made available by the KFPS. YoungKFPS can look back on a successful and educational 2021 and already has a full programme for 2022 with a host of physical activities on the agenda. Membership numbers of Young-KFPS grew substantially in this year. On 31 December 2020 Young-KFPS had 366 members and 34 friends, now numbers have risen to 431 members and 51 friends.



2. Staff

2.1 Staff mutations

Office

In 2021 there were a number of staff mutations. The mutations over recent years are displayed in the diagram below.



After good mutual consultation and approval from the Member Council the employment of General Director Ids Hellinga came to an end in 2021. The Board is very grateful to Mr Hellinga for his huge commitment and very valuable contributions to the KFPS during his 18-year employment. After Mr Hellinga's departure the function of General Director was temporarily taken over by Manager PR and Communication Marijke Akkerman, in cooperation with Financial Manager Nynke Bakker. Together with the other colleagues, the office organisation has successfully managed to secure the continuity of KFPS activities and whenever possible made sure that events could go ahead.

For this the Board is very grateful to their KFPS staff. In 2021 and after two years, the temporary employment contract of Wytske Schuth, Manager Inspections & Education expired and together the decision was taken not to renew the contract. As of December 1st Greetje Swart is the new Manager.

3 Financial statements

3.1 General


Below, a limited number of subjects from the KFPS financial report are pointed out. For a good understanding of the comprehensive financial situation of the KFPS we advise you to consult the Annual Account 2021 which is available on financien@kfps.nl.

3.2 Financial situation

The financial after-tax result in 2021 amounts to € 26,703 negative. We had already expected a negative result in 2021 due to the cancellation of the stud service fee in 2021. Starting in 2022 the stud service fee will be added to the foal registration fee. The negative effects as a result of Corona have been compensated by the support measures. The contribution from the NOW measures regarding running costs for staff stands at € 127,137. The contribution from the TVL scheme regarding fixed overhead costs stands at € 226,527. Staff expenses are € 88,321 higher than budgeted.

Income from securities is € 82,273 higher than budgeted. A positive note worth mentioning is the rise in membership

numbers and the increased number of registrations. With own capital amounting to € 4,014,208 and a solvability ratio of 74% the society can be considered as very healthy. The liquidity ratio of the Studbook can also be listed as excellent.

For the total of fiscal losses to be compensated over 2021 we have incorporated a deferred debit under financial fixed assets. The increase of the claim is principally the claim of the compensation of Corona support measures as well as the claim of corporate tax.

Key figures and profit and loss account.

Again in 2021, KFPS activities were strongly influenced by the Corona pandemic. In the Budget for 2021 we already anticipated the organisation of an online Stallion Inspection without public and the losses resulting from it. For this reason the Member Council approved a budgeted deficit of € 200,000 with an additional (once-only) budgeted deficit of € 160,000 in connection with the transference of the stud service fee to the foal registration fee



in the autumn of 2020. This comes down to the Member Council's approval of a Budget for 2021 of € 360,000 negative, on the condition that no support measures would be forthcoming from the Government. In 2021 the Member Council also approved the payment of a transitional reimbursement to the General Director due to the termination of his employment.

With the consent of the Member Council the Board has decided to refund the payment support received for the year 2020, because the KFPS only suffered limited financial damage due to Corona in 2020. This was partly thanks to a normal Stallion Inspection and Friesian Proms including audiences in January 2020. However, the situation in 2021 and 2022 was different because in these years the Stallion Inspection and Friesian Proms had to be organised without public. The results from the Stallion Inspection and Friesian Proms represent a substantial contribution towards the running costs for staff and fixed costs of the KFPS. This is why we submitted a request for Government support measures for the year 2021. The temporary Noodmaatregel Overbrugging Werkgelegenheid (NOW,

financial support measure, ed.) supports businesses and their staff who are faced with a loss of turnover in a certain period as a result of Corona. The Tegemoetkoming Vaste Lasten (TVL, Fixed Costs Compensation, ed.) seeks to relieve payment of overheads such as rent, tenancy, maintenance, insurances, lease contracts and subscriptions. The KFPS meets the requirements of these schemes. Requests for the various NOW measures were submitted in 2021 as well as a once-only request for the TVL scheme.

Aside from the effects of the transference of stud service fees and the contributions from support measures, the proceeds over 2021 have, as a result of Corona, dropped by around 30% from around €3.1 million without Corona to around €2.2 million with Corona.

4. Breeding and registration

4.1 Breeding goal and breeding programme

The breeding goal describes the general lines of policy objectives in relation to the characteristics of the Friesian horse. The breeding goal is the foundation of the breeding- and selection programme of the KFPS. The breeding goal provides an image of the ideal Friesian horse in all its facets. Further finetuning of the breeding goal takes place every 10-15 years. This was done in the past years and the breeding goal was approved in the autumn of 2021. The Breeding Council plays an important role in the formulation of the breeding goal. The new concept of the breeding goal is also partly based on the surveys that were carried out and the discussions during the 'tour through the country in 2019.

This discussion round also formed the basis for the approved KFPS Strategy 2019-2024. On the one hand, the breed characteristics as indicated in the mission of the KFPS are leading for the breeding goal. On the other hand, also taken into consideration is the best way to position the Friesian horse in the equestrian spectrum. Generally speaking, we can claim that in terms of character (reliability) the Friesian breed has a clear advantage over other specialised sport breeding programmes, and compared to (most) other breeds has a clear advantage in terms of aptitude for the sport. The above has produced the strategic choice of lending equal weighing factors to breed characteristics, character (reliability) and sport aptitude within the present breeding goal. Additional defined basic requirements are health and life expectancy which therefore have high-priority status.

The breeding programme describes all selection-related activities about how to realise the breeding goal. That includes things like inspections and aptitude tests, as well as the interlinked system of predicates. The breeding programme also lists what information/ data is collected and how these data can be used. In this context breeding values are becoming increasingly more important. In the context of research, breeding values were calculated on the basis of KNHS sport data for the first time in 2020. This was also done in 2021. Along with the breeding values for sport aptitude on the basis of aptitude tests, these breeding values are set to play a part in the continued process of improving the Friesian horse as a utility- and sport horse. This also involves the development of breeding values for character gathered from the data of offspring in ABFP Tests. In order to find the right balance in the genetic progress of the various breeding goal characteristics, the Total Index was introduced in 2019, which also weighs in kinship.

Management of inbreeding plays an important role in the breeding programme. For this, the meticulous monitoring of increase in inbreeding is key. It's good to see that this stays well below the critical norm (of 1% per generation) for the 2021 year collection of foals.

4.2 Breeding and research

The focal point of breeding research within the KFPS is to find genetic tests for innate disorders. In recent years the emphasis has been on oesophageal dilation, aortic rupture and sweet itch. For the research into oesophageal problems we partnered up with the Fenway Foundation in the US in 2020, which promotes breeding research in the US. We have jointly drawn up a project proposal which will be carried out by the University of Kentucky. Also involved are the current KFPS partners of the universities of Wageningen, Utrecht and Gent. This research continued in 2021 and the first results are expected to come through in 2022.

4.3 Inseminations

The number of registered inseminations shows a nice growth. At the first time-check in early April 2022 there were 5000 registered inseminations for stud season 2021. In 2020 this number was 4682 (4547 according to Year Plan 2020 plus 135 later registrations of inseminations). Insemination registrations show that 123 different stallions were used in 2021. The Reserve Champion of the 2021 Stallion Inspection, Jehannes 484, came top of the list with 251 stud services, followed by Teun 505 (200), Matthys 504 (182), Tiede 501 (182), Alwin 469 (180) and Auwert 514 (180).

4.4 Registered foals

3882 births were reported in 2021, 182 more than the year before. From these foals 3513 were registered (chipped). Part of the rest (foreign countries) will be registered and chipped at a later date. Of the registered foals 89% have been registered in the main section. Registration numbers in the B-books were as follows: B-Book I: 67; B-Book II: 319; D-Book: 7. The number of registrations in the B-Books is slightly higher than in the previous year.

4.5 Inspections

Just like in 2020, the inspection season of 2021 was organised in a different way because of the Corona pandemic. Due to restrictions the studbook inspections could not go ahead in the pre-season, but we were able to organise inspections at the locations of training stables. Initially, all inspections on location took place without public, with the later relaxation of measures owners were allowed to be present again. All inspections on location were reported via livestreaming and on average were followed live by 200 to 500 fans, or viewed later on demand. There were in total 29 inspections on location in the months of April, May and June. Breeding days could go ahead again in July and August. Only the breeding day on Ameland could not go ahead. Twelve breeding days were organised, unfortunately still partly without spectators. In September and October five Studbook inspections took place as well as eight foal inspections. The total number of inspected horses in the Netherlands has slightly grown compared to 2020. This growth is mainly found in the youngster categories. The other categories show a small drop. The total number in the Netherlands still lies a little below the numbers we saw before Corona in 2019. Thanks to relaxation of measures the Central Inspection could go ahead with the presence of the public. This was an outdoor event and the first edition to be organised in Harich. The good weather and the opportunity to meet again after all these restrictions turned the event into a huge success. Unfortunately though, many of the foreign inspections could not take place because of the restrictions. As was the case in 2020, only those inspections that were at a driving distance could take place. Because there were more of these, the number of inspected horses in foreign countries has gone up a bit. But this is still half as much as before Corona in 2019.



4.6 Inspection results

The table diagrams at the bottom of this page show the inspection results of foal inspections and the predicates awarded to adult horses. The percentage of first premiums for foals was 20%, which is the same average as in recent years. In the category adult horses the number of Star mares is back to its normal level. The number of Star stallions has dropped. This is largely the effect of the absence of inspections outside Europe, where in the spring of 2020 only a few inspections went ahead.

In the current breeding goal the breeding characteristics character (reliability) and sport aptitude are fully equivalent.

4.7 Re-inspections

From the horses inspected at Studbook inspections, breeding days or inspections on location in 2021, 58 horses were presented for a re-inspection, a decrease of 7 (9%) compared to last year. Fourteen horses were 'upgraded' at the re-inspection and three horses received a lower inspection result.

4.8 Preferent and Performance

The Preferent- and Performance predicates are awarded to mares with good-quality offspring in terms of exterior or sport. In 2021 the number of mares that became Preferent was 33, which is 25 less than in last year. The number of mares that became Performance was 29, one more than in 2020. Studbook stallion Alwin 469 was declared Preferent in 2021.

4.9 Performance Tests

The KFPS differentiates between three types of performance tests which provide information about the sport aptitude of young horses: the Central Examination, the ABFP Test and the IBOP Test. The assessment results from performance tests play an important role in the breeding programme, in the selection of stallions and for awarding predicates. The performance predicates that were introduced in 2019, the A suffixes, provide insight into the results. In the year 2021 there were 62 horses that obtained the A predicate (73-76.5 points), 131 obtained the AA predicate (77-81.5 points) and 43 secured the AAA predicate (82 points or higher). Mares are the largest group of horses with a performance predicate, about three-quarters.

4.9.1 ABFP tests

A total of 117 ABFP Tests were completed in 2021, six 5-week tests and nine 2-week tests. Due to Corona no ABFP Tests were ridden in the United States in 2021. The majority of ABFP Tests are ridden in the context of progeny testing.

4.9.2 IBOP Tests

Compared to 2020, more IBOP Tests were completed in 2021. In total there were 273 riding tests, 61 driving tests and 1 showdriving test. The average score was well over 74 points, about 1 point lower than the year before.

4.10 Central Examination

For the fifth time running the Central Examination took place at Hippisch Centrum Exloo in the autumn of 2021. The young stallions followed a new training programme based on measurements and analyses from sport physiologist Caroline Munsters and her Moxie Sport team. The Presentation Days kicked off with 54 stallions. Seventeen stallions started their performance testing on September the 7th. At the end five stallions were registered in the Studbook register via the Central Examination. Martzen 521 was registered in the Studbook

4.11 Progeny Test

Four stallions successfully completed their Progeny Test in 2021 and their stud licenses have been sustained. These were the stallions Julius 486, Eise 489, Meinte 490 and Jurre 495.

4.12 Stallion statistics

In addition to the newly-registered stallions and the completion of progeny testing there are some changes due to the deaths in 2021 of the following stallions: Abe 346, Fetse 349, Rik 396, Doaitsen 420, Mewes 438, Tjalf 443 and Wimer 461. Because he has not yet completed his progeny testing, the stud license for Walt 487 has been put on hold. As mentioned earlier, Alwin 469 was declared Preferent.

4.13 Inspection and Jury body

Two new prospective Inspectors were appointed in 2021: Manuel Gasseling and Popke van der Meulen. Also appointed were two new Performance Jury members: Jos van der Wal and Ito Werkman. The following two people were appointed prospective Exterior Jury members: Anouk Holleman and Marissa Visser. Ellen van Gastel has joined the Stallion Inspection Committee as prospective Inspector.

4.14 Ring masters

After 12½ years, Sjouke Bootsma (80) stopped his activities as a ring master at the end of 2021.

5. Sport

One of the core activities of the KFPS is to advance the Friesian horse's progress in the sport. In 2020 the World Breeding Federation for Sport Horses (WBFSH) accepted the KFPS as their member, which translates into the official recognition of the Friesian horse as a sport horse. This recognition opens doors for Friesian horses at international dressage competitions, such as the World Championships Dressage for Young Horses. Six young Friesian horses were entered for the selection of the WC Young Dressage Horses.

5.1 Sport predicates

116 horses acquired the Sport predicate in 2021, which is 15 down compared to last year. The Sport predicates were divided as follows:

Dressage: 105
Driving dressage: 10
Showdriving: 1

5.1.1 Sport Elite predicates

The Sport Elite predicate was introduced in 2017 and is awarded to horses who have realised a minimum of 5 x 60% scores at Prix St. Georges level or higher, or horses that have earned the Sport predicate in the following three disciplines: dressage, showdriving and driving.

In 2021 ten horses were awarded the Sport Elite predicate, which is 5 down compared to the previous year. The Sport Elite predicates were awarded in the following disciplines:

Dressage: 10 Three disciplines: 0

5.2 Pavo Fryso Cup

The Pavo Fryso Cup is intended to give a boost to young Friesian horses in the sport. The selection rounds take place on location of the organising breeding chapters, the finals take place during the Central Inspection. The Pavo Fryso Cup is open to 4-, 5- and

6-year-old horses. Starting in 2021 separate categories were organised for 5- and 6-year-old horses. The participating countries are the Netherlands, Germany, Belgium and Denmark.

The Championship of the Pavo Fryso Cup Showdriving Aptitude was ridden at the Central Inspection. Champion of the mares was Yfke LG Star (Tjaarda 483) with Susan Wind. In the stallion category it was Auke van Hilberalti Star (Jouwe 485) with Tsjalling de Boer who received the Champion sash.

5.3 Mei Grand Prix Nei Grand Prix

In early 2016 the KFPS joined the ambitious project MGPNGP, initiated by the KWPN & KNHS Fryslân, to help combinations move up through the ranks to the highest level in dressage, the Grand Prix, within three years. In 2019 the project continued under the name of MGPNGP 2.0, with Stal de Mersken as its main sponsor. Rien van der Schaft has taken over from Alex van Silfhout as trainer. Taking part in the senior category of this project on behalf of the KFPS are:

Marsja Dijkman with Geke fan'e Beijemastate (Beart 411) and Harmina Holwerda with Martzen 521 (Dries 421). Five riders are taking part in the Junior section of the project: Afke Weidenaar with Douwe van de Bijschuur (Tsjalle 454), Amber Hoogeveen with Nina fan Up to Date (Anders 451), Esmee Hoogeveen with Hedwich (Wobke 403), Jelmer Ketelaar with Jehannes 484 (Tsjalle 454) and Maud Gerding with Theun fan Henswoude (Jisse 433).

5.4 Competitions

Successfully steering its course through all the restrictions, the Horses2fly KFPS sport competition managed to continue to promote itself. During the final exam of the Central Examination in Mid November there were fantastic showdriving classes, a fine prelude to the finals in 2022. The drivers too swung into action again. Halfway into the year the selection rounds commenced and attracted many enthusiastic participants. In the end the Bronze Driver was handed over to Udo de Haan with Ciara S.R. (Alwin 469). The drivers succeeded to present themselves in a fantastic way at national levels. Renate Roling and Oukje fan it Hiem Star Sport Elite AA (Tsjalle 454 x Beart 411) became Hippiade Champion. For the Alrako KFPS Championship, which took place one day after the Central Inspection, a stunning one hundred horses

turned up for the Dutch Championship Friesian horses. And in early October the K&PP was able to organize a three-day Friesian horse event in Harich. Not a European Championship but still, a sporting battle in the dressage ring. After a year's silence the enthusiasm was omnipresent.

5.4.1 Friesian Talent Cup

The resilience of the organisers of the various competitions was yet again put to the test in 2021. The Friesian Talent Cup alternated physical competitions with video assessments and this way a large (online) audience could enjoy the Championship at the SI 2022. It was again Corina van den Bunt who managed to present the best young stallion: Hardy fan 'e Lytse Generael (Jehannes 484 x Beart 411). The 4-year-old Hiltsje B.L (Nane 492 x Beart 411) with Lilian de Waal became Champion of the mares.

6. Events

In 2020 we had a 'real' Stallion Inspection, but no Central Inspection. In 2021 it was just the other way around: the Stallion Inspection was an online affair and the Central Inspection – for the first time in Harich – was open to the public and became a huge success.

6.1 Stallion Inspection 2021

A Stallion Inspection but no audiences, it was all quite a challenge for the creativity of the KFPS. With strict procedures and good cooperation with the stallion keepers they managed to organise an online edition. Hundreds of thousands of people all over the world could enjoy the most magnificent Friesian Studbook stallions. In Drachten the cameras of Omrop Fryslân were on standby and at the ready to broadcast the footage in four different languages (Dutch, English, German and Friesian), into the world. No Friesian Proms, no shopping village and no 10,000 spectators in the grandstand, but at home in front of the telly people could relish the beautiful Friesian horses.

6.1.1 Inspection young stallions

The Stallion Inspection 2021 produced a total of 44 stallions for the Presentation Days.

6.1.2 Clinic Programme

During the online Stallion Inspection the stallion categories were

interspaced with educational and inspirational clinics. Tweespan for example knew how to captivate the viewers with the clinic Schooling a Young Horse to Grand Prix. There was a presentation of Sport Elite stallions under saddle and thanks to a spontaneous action Eise 489 and Wylster 463 gave a fine synchronized performance in front of the sjees.

6.1.3 Inspection Studbook stallions

Bit was once again Jehannes 484 who trotted to the Champion Title in the category older stallions. The Reserve Title of the older stallions was for Nane 492. In the category of younger stallions it was Teun 505 who captured the Title, with Reserve Champion Jurre 495 hot on his heels. Thanks to his consistent presentation Jurre 495 progressed in the course of the contest and in the end it was him who became the Overall Champion Stallion Inspection 2021. After 2017, 2018 and 2019 Jurre 495 added a fourth title to his name. Occasional team Wylster 463 and Eise 489 at the SI 2021.

In 2021 there were 116 horses that obtained the Sport predicate and 10 horses received the Sport Elite predicate.

6.1.4 Horse of the Year

'A horse with a bit of spark', is how breeder Marten van der Meer describes his homebred Wirdmer fan 'e Boppelannen who was pronounced Horse of the Year 2020. With his lady rider Lisanne Veenje this Beart 411 son competes internationally at Grand Prix level. The stallion is in ownership of Austria-based Perry and Claudia Prexl. 'Wirdmer competes successfully both in dressage and in driving sports.'

6.1.5 Breeder of the Year

The Title of KFPS Breeder of the Year 2020 went to Bauke de Boer from Nes. The 'Fan Bokkum' breeder not only achieved great performances in the inspection ring with his horses, but also in the aptitude tests and dressage they caught a lot of attention. 'This is the icing on the cake', Bauke responds, who reaps success with the breeding products from line 110. With 4 Stars, 1 Sport Elite, 5 Sport horses, 1 Performance mare, 2 Preferent mares and 1 AA score he came top of the leader board. The absolute gem from his breeding line lives in South Africa: Annichje fan Bokkum Model Sport Elite Preferent Performance AAA (Ulke 338 x Gaije 295), the most predicate-rich mare on the KFPS books.

6.2 Central Inspection

Blessed with very sunny weather and many spectators, the Central Inspection 2021 at Riding School Gaasterland in Harich was a fantastic culmination to a troublesome season. Overall Champion was Jentsje's Pleats Preliminary Crown (Jurre 495). The youthful Ilya was also Champion 3-year-olds and was bred by Jentsje de Groot. She is now owned by Chardon Stables, which therefore has SI Champion Jurre 495 as well as CI Champion Ilya living in their yard. The Reserve Title was for Hobke v.d. Peester Hoeve Preliminary Crown (Markus 491 x

Norbert 444), bred by Jaap Ekhart and in ownership of M.B. Huitink.

Champion 3-year-olds and Overall Champion: Ilya fan Jentsje's Pleats Preliminary Crown (Jurre 495 x Michiel 442)

Champion 4-6-year-olds: Fleur fan Hylpen Crown AA (Markus 491 x Wierd 409)

Champion 7-year-old and older mares: Talina van de Marne Model Sport (Tsjalle 454 x Jasper 366)

6.2.1. New Members Day

For the first time during the Central Inspection we had a New Members Day to familiarize new members with the world of the Friesian horse. Along with various clinics – about breeding and sport – which were organized with the help of YoungKFPS, there was ample opportunity to ask questions and to view the inspection of the best mares.

7. Promotion and Communication

7.1. Web shop and merchandise

Sales of merchandise have risen by 1% in 2021. Sales primarily take place online via the website and the articles are for sale at the KFPS Office and at events. There is a clear drop in turnover when no Stallion Inspection can be organised. The KFPS articles are also for sale via the web shops of Epplejeck and Tweespan Ruitersport.

7.2 Royal Friesian Club

The Royal Friesian Club was founded in 2013. The aim of the Royal Friesian Club is to encourage the mutual transfer of knowledge between Friesian horse enthusiasts. Normally, network meetings are organised twice a year to discuss a wide range of subjects centred around the Friesian horse. The first meeting of 2020 was during the Stallion Inspection and unfortunately, the second meeting had to be cancelled because of Covid-19.

7.3 Phryso and newsletters

Every month the KFPS publishes the magazine Phryso (5500 copies) with two digital newsletters in English and Spanish, which the foreign members receive in their mailbox.

7.4 Phryso.com in four languages

In addition to the Dutch, English and Spanish editions the German edition of Phryso.com also fully participated in the quick exchange of information in 2021. So we now have four language platforms which the KFPS uses to communicate and publish news, results, analyses and interviews about the Friesian horse. Partly because of all the digital solutions in Corona times, such as the livestream of the inspections on location and the First Viewing, the online news platform has gained in popularity for the third year running. In 2020 Phryso.com attracted

250,000 visitors, in 2021 the number of visitors rose to 343,000, which is a 37% increase. In 2021 most visitors tuned in to Phryso. com for the online Stallion Inspection 2021, a 3-day broadcast in four languages. In place two of the top ten of best-visited pages was Uniek fan 'e Goëngamieden who had shown herself to be successful foster mare. The mix of 'nice to know' and 'need to

know' information is what makes Phryso.com so attractive across the full spectrum of the community of Friesian horse lovers. Alongside Phryso.com the KFPS website serves as our Studbook site and offers a galore of information on breeding. The database with all the information about the Friesian horses is the beating heart of the website.

7.5 Social media, YouTube and KFPS TV

The digitalisation process was further developed in 2021 and our digital platforms drew in many visitors. The KFPS YouTube channel for instance generated a stunning 168% more viewing time than in 2020. Phryso.com and the KFPS Facebook page (with over 50,000 followers) served as promoters for news, backgrounds and interviews. Apart from the Netherlands

> (55.4%) visitors came from Germany (6.5%) and the United States (5.6%). The majority of viewers (62.6%) turns out to be 45 or older. The KFPS is active on Facebook, YouTube, Twitter, Instagram (to a lesser degree) and LinkedIn.

7.6 KFPS College Tour

The KFPS College Tour clearly answered the need to share more knowledge from the KFPS and her partners with the members in 2021. Experts gave captivating presentations about breeding but also about registration and fertility. The KFPS College Tour distinguished itself as a fantastic platform to engage in discussions in the so-called breeder cafés. The livestreams in the stallion blocks of De

Nieuwe Heuvel and Chardon Stables brought topical issues in breeding to the table, which triggered lots of inspiration for new ideas and insights. The revised edition of The Friesian Horse (in Dutch, English and German), supplied the new members of the KFPS with sound basic information to help them make a good start in breeding, care and sport with their black pearls.
